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in museums visitors are immediately drawn to striking or iconic objects but there are many less conspicuous but important items which illustrate cultural contexts and content and are equally deserving of their attention the authors of museums and silent objects offer a methodology for judging the quality of museum exhibitions from the visitor's perspective and offer practical tools for museum professionals to evaluate displays and design new galleries and exhibits fully illustrated and based on studies of world famous galleries this book is essential reading for those creating effective museum displays

exhibitions as research contends that museums would be more attractive to both researchers and audiences if we consider exhibitions as knowledge in the making rather than platforms for disseminating already established insights analysing the theoretical underpinnings and practical challenges of such an approach the book questions whether it is possible to exhibit knowledge that is still in the making whilst also considering which concepts of knowledge apply to such a format the book also considers what the role

of audience might be if research is extended into the exhibition itself providing concrete case studies of projects where museum professionals have approached exhibition making as a knowledge generating process the book considers tools of application and the challenges that might emerge from pursuing such an approach theoretically the volume analyses the emergence of exhibitions as research as part of recent developments within materiality theories object oriented ontology and participatory approaches to exhibition making exhibitions as research will be of interest to academics and students engaged in the study of museology material culture anthropology and archaeology it will also appeal to museum professionals with an interest in current trends in exhibition making

while many museums have ignored public art as a distinct arena of art production and display others have either grudgingly or enthusiastically embraced it some institutions have partnered with public art agencies to expand the scope of special exhibitions other museums have attempted to establish in house public art programs this is the first book to contextualize the collaborations between museums and public art through a range of essays marked by their coherence of topical focus written by leading and emerging scholars and artists organized into three sections it represents a major contribution to the field of art history in general and to those of public art and museum studies in particular it includes essays by art historians critics curators arts administrators and artists all of whom help to finally codify the largely unwritten history of how museums and public art have and continue to intersect key questions are both addressed and offered as topics for further discussion who originates such public art initiatives funds them and most importantly establishes the philosophy behind them is the efficacy of these initiatives evaluated in the same way as other museum exhibitions and programs can public art ever be a permanent feature in any museum and finally are the museum and public art ultimately at odds or able to mutually benefit one another

the essays in this volume are organised thematically the first essay sets the scene by reviewing the present position and future potential of science museums as educational and cultural resources the next section is devoted to the role of museum exhibitions and analyses how exhibitions deal with complex material the third section is concerned with museum programmes and reports on the strengths and weaknesses of different museum programmes ranging from gallery drama to the boston museum s innovative experiment with science by mail

what goes on behind closed doors at museums how are decisions about exhibitions made and who or what really makes them why are certain objects and styles of display chosen whilst others are rejected and what factors influence how museum exhibitions are produced and experienced this book answers these searching questions by giving a privileged look behind the scenes at the science museum in london by tracking the history of a particular exhibition macdonald takes the reader into the world of the museum curator and shows in vivid detail how exhibitions are created and how public culture is produced she reveals why exhibitions do not always reflect their makers original intentions and why visitors take home particular interpretations beyond this local context however the book also provides broad and far reaching insights into how national and global political shifts influence the creation of public knowledge through exhibitions
